PENNSYLVANIA'S BEVERUE. The Liquor Warfare Causes a Failing off in the

Receipts. The revenue of the state of Pennsylvania for the past year aggregated \$7,520,711.13, as against \$8,179,714.28 the previous year. The expenditures amounted to \$7,203,295,42 showing a decrease of \$1,309,962.11. This large reduction in payments was due mainly to the fact that the legislature was not in session this year. The falling off in the revenues of the state was largely due to the successful warfare made against the issuing of liquor and restaurant licenses in many por-tions of Pennsylvania. Last year \$63,000 was derived from liquor licenses, and this year the amount has dropped to \$44,000. There is also a decrease of \$64,000 in the eat-ling house licenses tay. The collateral inhering house license tax. The collateral inheritance tax of five per cent. realized \$642,000, which is a little more than the annual aver-

age.

The tax on the capital stock of corporations The tax on the capital stock of corporations reached \$1,729,000, and the gross receipts tax \$1,210,000. Owing to the improvement of the business of corporations they paid Bearly \$300,000 more tax on gross receipts than the previous year. The banks contributed \$115,000, to the revenue of the state; personal property. \$622,000, and foreign insurance companies \$334,000. The various licenses, including liquor, netted a revenue of about \$650,000, During Governor Pattison's administra-During Governor Pattison's administra tion of four years more charters to corpora-tions were issued than during the previous decade, and the bonuses on charters have consequently largely increased. The addi-tional revenues from this source the past

year aggregated about \$40,000.

The constitution of the state requires that the public debt shall be reduced at least \$250,-00 annually, but the large tax collections enabled a reduction of over \$700,000 the
