R. Curtis, an actor. It reveals a queer state (of things. It is, with the exception of merely a things. It is, with the exception of merely a dozen words or so a reprint of the "Nan from Solano," by Mr. Bret Harte, published origi-nally a tew years ago in the Sun. Of course the Mirror has been imposed upon, and whether Mr. Curits has been imposed upon also, or is the imposter himself, remains to be determined. It is hardly conceivable that an actor, who relies for much of his pros-perity upon the favor of the New York public would boldly perpetrate such a fraud as paim-ing off one of Mr. Bret Harte's stories as his own. It is more probable that being apown. It is more probable that being ap-plied to, together with a number of other setters, to contribute to the columns of the Mirror, he hired some one of greater literary experience than himself to provide the desired contribution, and then signed it, unconscious that he was putting his name to a production of one of the most brilliant of contemporary writers of English retion. If Curtis and the Mirror had agreed that a third party should write Caris' story, then they were both the victius of the undaunted pirate who stole from Mr. Harte. If the Mirror understood that "The Major's Story" was to be from the actor's own pen, then Curtis sold the Mirror and, probably, this journeyman pirate sold Curits.


