MORET MATTERS IN LANCASTER. The Hank Cashiers Report & Good New Year's Business and Good Cutlook for the

Coming Season, A representative of the INTELLIGENCER nterviewed the cashiers of the several banks in this city this morning with a view of ascertaining the condition of the money market and the business outlook for the coming vear.

Fon Dersmith, cashier of the Far-mers' National bank, said the business of the bank had been larger in 1886 than in 1885, and that on Monday, the first business day of 1887, the business was unusually large. Money is sufficiently abundant to accommo-date all the patrons of the bank. Borrowers of money for business purposes are generally paying off a part of their indebtedness, an indication that mercantile and manufactur-ing branches are flourishing. At the Lancaster County National bank about the usual New Year's business was

Cashier Hertzler, of the Fulton Na-tional bank, said they had a regular lat of April rush on Monday last; did a larger business than on any former New Year's day. There were heavy deposits and a good demand for money, and pienty of money to supply the demand. He thought the outlook for the ensuing year very good for banking and all other branches of trades. Cashier Harner, of the First National bank. 




