OMBIA, Jan. 12 -On Tuesday after mespionion occurred on the Pennsylay night. The men had worked about one and one-half hours, when a peculiar hissing noise pave warning of approaching danger. Sud-denly the loaded tank exploded and then a scene followed which beggars description. The oil burst into flames, which that a least ho feet in the air and made a circle of about 60 feet. The men started to run in all directions but were caught by the blazing oil force of the Middletown wreckers received injuries, some of which are of a very serious nature, Foreman Rich, of Bainbridge, is burned seriously and had a large gush in his head. Gould, Albert Kimes and G. Edward Baight, received very painful injuries from the blazing oil. A number of the workmen re-ceived slight burns about the face and hands, and as the men were running down the tracks, they had their clothing burned by the oil falling on them. Edward Smith and Philip Hoover, of the despatcher's office, re-ceived burns about their faces. The force of the explosion caused one end of the tank to be blown over the canal bridge, high in the air, and landing in the words about tank to be blown over the canal bridge, high in the air, and landing in the woods about S00 yards from the wreek. Another portion was rent high in the air, falling on the east track, about 100 yards from the starting place. Albert Kimes received burns on his head and hands as he was jump-ing over a tence and a large bar of iron flew past his head and was buried in the snow some distance further on. About sixty men were working about the place, and out of that number not over ten men escaped from burns or had over ten men escaped from burns or had their ciothing damaged. The bijured men were soon given assistance by those not hurt. The men from Middletown were sent to their bomes, and Balght, Roland and Gould brought to Columbia, as they were more seriously burned. In conversation with one of the men, who had been burned, he said that he lived years in the few brief seconds following the explosion. In the wreck and burn-ing, ten cars of the Peunsylvania railroad have been destroyed and their loss is a heavy






