OLUMBIA, Jan. 15 .- On account of the d weather and warm rains of the past low ys the various tributaries of the Susque server, which empties into the river about miles north of Port Deposit, is unally high. The creek has been covered m 12 to 15 inches in thickness, nice has been broken up by the sudden no. The ice coming in contact with the iron ridge of the Columbia & Port Deposit road company, which spans the creek s Octoraro, has formed a formidable gorge ad the destruction of the bridge seems probble. The railroad authorities ordered a force of men from Port Deposit Friday night, who have gone to the bridge to render what asvistance they can toward saving it. The dam of the McCullough Iron company, at Rowlandville, contains ice 15 inches in thickness, which is expected to break up every moment When this heavy ice reaches the bridge, in addition to the gorge now there, should the bridge not be relieved, its destruction will biless be inevitable. There is no perceptible rise in the Susquehanna as yet, and the condition of the ice in the river remains unchanged.

The Court Decides a Number of Cases Argues at the December Term-Current Business.

Court met this morning at 10 o'clock for the delivery of opinions of cases argued the December term and the transaction of current business.

OPINION DAT IN OUTRY.

JUDGE LIVINGSTON'S OPINIONS. Judge Livingston delivered opinions in the following cases :
