Philadelphia's Great Toboggan Stide. The longest public toboggan slide in the country was officially opened Wednesday night at Belmont, in Fairmount park, Phila-

It has been constructed under the direc-

tion of Mr. William M. Singerly. starts across the drive from Belmont mansion. Forty feet above the ground, on a level with the roof of the mansion, is the spacious platform, is by 84 feet from which the toboggans start. From there the slide descends to the ground at a point 172 feet distant. The slide is 54 feet wide, built of heavy plants, supported on trestle work firmly brased and boiled to-gether. There are four chutes, 414 feet wide. gether. There are four chutes, 414 feet wide, down which the toboggans travel, and on each side there are a dragway and flight of stairs for returning coasters. From the foot of the first section of the slide the descent is continued by the natural slope of the ground for a distance of 600 feet, crossing the abandoned roadway, which, in centennial days, was behind the sgricultural building, by a wooden bridge the full width of the slide and 110 feet in length. The total length of the wooden slide length. The total length of the wooden slide and its natural extension is 772 feet, in which distance there is a vertical descent of 132 feet. From the foot of the slope a level plateau stretches away to the south for a distance of 1.400 feet, giving a total coasting distance of 2.200 feet. The 4.000 foot slide erected at Tuxedo park by Mr. Pierre Lorliard is classed as a private affair, the Philadelphia slide being open to the public.
