The Girls Strike at Central Exchange-Over work and Low Wages-Complaints

From the Country. This morning three of the four girls emloyed at the telephone exchange in City hall struck, Their grievance, as stated to an NTELLIGENCER representative, is that one of their companions took sick this week and the other three were compelled to do the work of four. There are about \$00 subscribers to the telephone service and the girls say there should be five operators instead of three to properly perform the work. They say also

that the inside of the windows have been white washed under the false protense that they neglect their work, and not satisfied with this imposition the manager this morning screwed down the window each, thus preventing them getting proper ventilation. Their wages are only \$13 per month which they consider a poor equivalent for their close confinement and long hours of service. To-day the night operators and the sick girl, Mary Hess, are the only ones on duty. The telephone service has not been entirely satisfactory to city subscribers, and will now

probably be worse. Complaints also come in from the country. The telephone connection has been cut off from New Holland entirely, the instruments have been removed, and there are poor prospects of having them replaced. The Clarion complains that this is a bulldozing set. whereby a wealthy corporation attempts to force the public to its own terms ; and predicts the calling off of country connections will soon show a marked decrease in city patropage. 
