Main Street, Port Deposit, Under Water

Wednesday's Dispatch to Baltimore Sun. All the people in Port Deposit are awake to-night, owing to the high water bere. Main street is all under water except for a space of 200 yards in the centre square. The ice is gorged between the town and the Baltimore & Ohio bridge, and about I o'clock this afternoon the river began rising, though it afterwards fell somewhat. The water now varies from a lew tuches to five feet in depth in the streets immediately along the river. People on that side of Main street nearest the river moved

out when the rise came. At McCall's Ferry, twenty two miles above here, the ice is reported to be gorged to a depth of sixty feet. That part threatens to break at any moment, and when it does the situation here will become more serious. In anticipation of this everybody is moving about. They think the worst will come early

to-morrow morning.

Immense quantities of lumber from Jas. A. Davis' mills, above, have been carried past here by the floating ice. The people here say that the situation is worse than last year on account of the way the ice broke. It leads towards this side, and if the solid ice near the town gets broken by the ice coming down it is thought all the lower part of the town will be in danger. The principal damage so far reported is the carrying away of the depot platform and part of Ephralm Cornish's restaurant. Travel, except in a limited space, is by bosts. Rock Run, the upper part of the town, is where the water is deepest. The fire engines have been drawn up out of the reach of the water.
