We may safely count on an immense imration this year, first because of the imminence of foreign war and the wish to escape from military service ; and secondly, because of revival of prosperity in mtry. This second cause will also lead to an increase of the volume of travel from America to Europe, and if war should come, it will so stimulate all industries as to draw people from the Old World in spite of all their governments may do to prevent it. The great powers are strictly enforcing their laws requiring military duty, and any young man wishing to escape it must exercise considerable strategy. The United States does not want a boom under the artificial stimulus of foreign wars, but an era of good times is dawning, and its steady natural progress will give enduring wealth and strength. The Moral of Trusts Betrayed.

The morning news presents several instances of trusts betrayed. Thomas M. Josephs, treasurer of the grand lodge of Odd Fellows of Texas, has confessed a deficit of \$23,185 in his accounts with the grand lodge, that sum embracing the entire lodge fund. W. T. Bingham, of Boston, a trustee for aged ladies, has ember zled \$17,000 of their funds. The head cashier of the Banco Industrial at Havana. has fled leaving a shortage of \$55,000 in his accounts.

In each of these cases it is reported that the faithless defaulter possessed the entire confidence of those towards whom he occupied the fiduciary relation. They regarded their trustee as above suspicion. and their loss is measured by the extent of their faith.
