The introduction of the water was colebrated by a public demonstration of rejoicing. At the time the works went into operation, Feb. 22, 1887, there were only twenty persons who took the water and the revenue therefrom for the first year was \$187.05. Now there are over \$,000 water restors, and the revenue from first year was \$157.95. Now there are over \$,000 waser renters, and the revenue from the water department is over \$50,000 per year. In \$567 the water works had cost over \$100,000, including a farm which was subsequently sold for \$16,903.15. The estimated value of the water works is now over \$500,000, and its annual maintenance is about \$11,000, exclusive of pipe laying and other improvements, which hast year amounted to about \$15,000.

The increase in the consumption of water

has been immense. In 1837 a few thousand gallons a day sufficed to serve the city; now it takes about 3,000,000 gallons. In 1837 the Concetoga was comparatively a clean stream, except when great rains prevailed in its affluents; now it is tainted with impurities all along its borders and the question is upon us to-day, "what are you going to do about it?" Various schemes for a larger and purer supply of water are being agitated. At the late municipal election the citizens voted to increase the city debt \$125,000 to improve the

water supply and the sewerage. To-morrow the mayor, the superintendent of water works and the water committee of councils will visit New York and other points adjacent, for the purpose of making ob-servations of the working of various systems of obtaining pure water from impure sources and they will probably secure the services of s civil engineer to survey the ground, and formulate plans to furnish Lancaster with an abundance of pure water for family use and manufacturing purposes.
