The tracks of the Columbia & Port Deposit railroad are almost cleared of the ice, and the work will be finished in a short time. The passenger train is running south from Columbia to Creswell, and north from Ferryville to Sals Harbor. A number of workmen have been home, not being needed as the ice will soon be cleared away.

The Till Family of London will appear in the opera house on Saturday evening, when the Rock band concert will be given. Mr. John W. Russell, late reporter on the York Dispatch, has accepted a position as manager of the Columbia oil company, which has headquarters at Third and Locust streets. Mr. Russell next week will enter upon his duties. While Daniel Sempie, flagman on shifting engine No. 553 of the Pennsylvania railroad was coupling cars in the west yards yesterday afternoon he had a finger of his right hand caught in a bar and it was crushed. A car loaded with coal jumped the track on the Columbia rolling mill siding yesterday. The car had to be uncoupled before it could be recoupled. The tracks were very much broken. The visiting military officers paid a visit to the Post room of Gen. Webb, Post last evening. They were very much pleased over the handsome appearance of the Post. The services this evening in the St. Paul's F. M. church will be conducted by Rev. J. Graham, of St. John's church, Marietta. The owners of the sand machines are putting their machines in order to be ready for the opening of the season.

SAFETY HARBOR BRIDGE SHARDED. The Columbia & Port Deposit Railway Not Yet Opened. Master Carpenter Wm. K. Beard, of the Pennsylvania railroad, who superintended the erection of the temporary bridge across the Conestoga creek at Sals Harbor, in place of the railroad bridge destroyed at that place by the recent freshet and ice logs, returned to Lancaster Thursday evening, bringing his corps of workmen along with him. He reports the bridge finished and the rails laid, and that a locomotive crossed it yesterday afternoon. The bridge will not be resumed on the railroad for some time, as there are many repairs to be made between Columbia and Sals Harbor. The workmen injured by the falling of timbers during the building of the bridge are getting along slowly, and will soon be ready for duty. Simon Beck, the young colored man, who raised a row on election day, was heard by Alderman Barr last evening. William H. Pendergast appeared as the prosecutor, and he charged Beck with drunkenness and disorderly conduct during the election. Pendergast conducted the case exceedingly ably and the jury found Beck guilty of the charges. He was sentenced to ten days, and the latter charge was returned to court. Tom Sullivan and John Anderson were committed last night by Alderman Barr for ten days for drunkenness and disorderly conduct. George Thomas and John Conway were held for five days for the same offense. These four men had the appearance of those who would not work if they had to do so and preferred to spend the winter in jail and work-houses.

The Ruggled Head Crisped. The famous Ringgold head of Reading has met with some trouble. A number of users have withdrawn, and although the remaining musicians are receiving encouragement to continue, the organization may probably collapse.
