The Inter-State Commerce Act. into operation in early April, sixty days from the date of its approval, February 4. It will not apply to the handling of property free or at reduced rates for charitable purposes or to or from fairs and exposition for exhibitions thereat, or to the issuan of mileage, excursion or commutation passenger tickets. Reduced rates may be given to ministers of religion and free carriage to officers and employes.

The sudden withdrawal of commutation

and mileage tickets by the Pennsylvania and Reading roads cannot be connected with the inter-state commerce act in any way. It is simply the first pressure of a great monopoly that must before long make its strong grip felt and which will meet with no formidable opposition.

JOHN F. MEGINNESS, an old Colerain township boy, who has never lost his fond-ness for Lancaster county, is about to perther valuable service for his adopted home in Northwestern Pennsylvania. Long identified with Williamsport as editorial manger of the Gazette and Bulletin, he has seen very active and influential in promot ing public spirit and in advancing the moral and material interests of that municipality. He wrote the history of the West Branch valley thirty years ago, and is the author of Williamsport's "Resources and Industries," a work similar to that which is about to be published under the auspices of our Board of Trade; and now Mr. Meginness announsee that he will soon start a monthly histori cal journal, to collect and preserve the local history of that section of the state. In this periodical special attention will be given to the collection of historical incidents of early times, reminiscences of piomears, indian antiquities, necrology, longevity, statistics, manufactures and curious things. The field will be in the West Branch valley of the Scanning. valley of the Susquehanne, the Juniata region, and the Northwestern counties of the state. Mr. Magniness is well equipped for his work; and his idea may serve as a hint to the Lancaster county historical society.

MR. JOHN B. HAWES, U. S. commercial agent of Reichenberg, Austria calls the atten-tion of American sleigh builders to the open-ing for their product in Bohemian and Austria. The sleighs in use there are heavy and clumsy, low in the runners and as open as possible. Even the dashboard consists of net work instead of being solid. To compensate for this, passengers dress warmly in fur coats and draw over the limbs fur moks that reach to the waist. Another feature of the Bohemian sleigh is the break. Every vehicle even to little carts drawn by dogs, has a break attached, and the sleigh is not an exception. This operates by means of a crank and screw, and drives two irons down into the snow, one by the side of each runner. The second variety of sleighs is lighter, and holds two passengers, with a seat behind for a coachman. THE report of Consular Agent Chambers, of Batoum, on the Russian petroleum trade has been published, and the facts therein de-tailed make it evident that American petroleum will find the competition of the product of the Baku peninsula on the Caspian very serious indeed. Baku is a very ancient city, but since the development of its petroleum industry has grown so rapidly that it now claims 60,000 inhabitants, or five times its population in 1870. The great petroleum district is eight miles north of flaku and there are in it 164 producing wells, varying in depth from 175 to 1,030 feet; the average depth being 500 feet. The yield of these wells is estimated at 58,000 barrels daily, but the closing of the Volga by los in winter and the great number holidays in Russia make the number of working days much less per year than in America.

When the wells do not flow they are pumped, but many of the flowing wells are fitted with a pipe and valve and can be opened or closed at will. In this way the well answers the purpose of a tank, and oil oan be drawn off at will. The most productive well ever drilled on the peninsula ductive well ever drilled on the peninsula was Nobels' No. 15, which was handled just as a large tank would be, opened and closed at will, and gave a total production of 1,800,-000 barrels (of 42 gallons).

The largest well ever struck is Nobels' 9, which threw a column of oil eight inches in diameter to a height of from two to three hundred feet, but only flowed for 32 days. In quality the Russian oil is far inferior to the American and only 30 per cent. of it is sold for illuminating purposes, but the pro-hibitory tariff levied by Russis on American oil has reserved that great market for the Russian product.
