Weber, veterinary surgeon, was found in an unconscious condition in his room at the street, as a surprise to Mr. M. J. Snook, and Keystone hotel. Dr. M. L. Herr was a Mr. and Mrs. J. W. McCune. There were once sent to attend him, and found him suffering from morphia or other narcotic, and applied the proper remedies. Up to noon o day Dr. Weber had not regained conscious ness, and was regarded to be in a rather critical condition. served. Yesterday Dr. Weber was suffering from

a bad cold and from neuralgis, and stated o a friend that he was going to take a dose of quining. Before going to bed, about 1 clock last night, he said to the ostler at the Keystone that he believed he had taken the wrong medicine. During the night his groans were heard by some of the boarders, but they paid no attention to them, supposing them to be those of a drunken man. It is believed by Dr. Weber's friends that

DRAINAGE AND WATER IMPROVEMENT

Survey of Roseville Hill, Hostetter's and Hansecker's Dams, Eden Hill and Other Points. Tuesday afternoon at 1 o'clock the committee on survey of drainage and improvement of the water works met at the mayor's office, and in company with the city regulator took carriages and drove to Roseville, 3 miles north of this city, where there is a hill which was supposed to be high enough to afford a site for a reservoir to supply this city with water by gravitation. The party visited the hill and by the use of the regu istor's instruments sighted the present reser voirs, when it was found that the top of the hill was found to be five feet lower than the top of the reservoirs. The top of the hill in rear of Franklin and Marshall college was also sighted, and it was found to be ten fee higher than the Roseville bill.

The committee next proceeded to Hostetter's mill, on the Conestoga, and surveyed the surroundings. They found the distance from the mill to Roseville to be about two and three quarter miles, and from Hunsecker's mill three and a half miles. From this point the committee reached the New Holland pike and surveyed all the different points, and, stopping at Eden, found the highest point there to be on a level with the ottom of the city reservoirs. Another Ordinance to be Enforced. Under instruction from the mayor the chief of police will hereafter enforce the fol soprano lowing of a city ordinance : ¹⁰ That no person or persons shall be per-mitted to expose for sale any mead, beer, cakes, fruit, nuts, or aweetmeats on the pave ments, street, lawns, or alleys in this city, except in the market space during market hours, and except such person or persons as shall have received permission from the mayor. And the mayor is directed to con-fine the permits to sell as aforesaid, to such old, infirm and orderly persons as have no other visible means of earning a livelihood, or to such other orderly persons as he may in his discretion think proper; lowing of a city ordinance : twenty-five cents. livelihood, or to such other orderly persons as be may in his discretion think proper; and to endeavor to grant as few permits as may be to minors and young persons, or adults who are able to work, and would be better employed at some useful trade, call-ing or occupation. And if any person or permons shall expose for sale any mead, beer, cakes, fruits, nuts or sweetmeats without permission from the mayor as aforesaid, be, she, or they, so offending, on conviction thereof, shall pay a fine of one dollar for each offense."




