Four of five weeks ago a young man of genteel appearance stepped into the shop of Philip Seacrist, shoemaker, No. 102 North Prince street, and asked permission to leave a package there for a few days, as he was going to Philadelphia and did not care to carry it with him. The young man was of medium height, well dressed, wore a ping hat and a rather light overcoat of a slightly greeminh tint. Mr. Seacrist readily took charge of the package, which was wrapped up in brown paper and adwas wrapped up in brown paper and ad-dressed "James W. Matisch, Fort Worth, Texas." He did not sak the man his name,

as he expected to see him again in a few days; but when the days lengthened into weeks, Mr. Sescrist's curiosity became aroused, and he began to be alarmed at the prolonged absence of the young stranger. He resolved to open the package, although some of his friends suggested it might contain dynamite. THREE HUNDRED PROTOGRAPHS.
