PRE PROPOSED BET JAIL

The Board of Charities Give the Commissioners Some Points as to its Construction.
Cadwalader Biddle and Philip B. Garrett, of Philadelphia, of the State Board of Charities, were in the city to-day in reference to the propose new prison. They were mot at the depot by the commissioners and Mesers. John B. Warfel and S. H. Zahm, who apported them to the commissioners' who escorted them to the commissioners' office where they held the conference. They gave the commissioners some data from which plans and specifications can be pre-pared. They will insist on the following general features. The structure to be built in the shape of a T, with all the cells radiating from the centre. Under this plan the prison can be enlarged at any time with but little expense. The windows of the cells to be not over live inches wide to prevent escape and to be placed on the top of the cell; the cells to be eight by eighteen feet, in order to give the convicts room for work, and the location and plumbing should be such that there would be an abundance of flush water. They also want a part of the prison for women corvicts and to have it so arranged that the men can not have access to that part of the prison and a bath room in each corridor. The outer walls are to be thirty feet high and of sufficient thickness, with coping stone facing outwards and the partition walls the thickness of two bricks, with steel plates between them. The kitchen, they say, should be built in the

The commissioners took the visitors to the county farm and they looked at both of the sites, one on this and one on the other side of the creek, which have been suggested for the new prison. After examining both they said they had no choice, as either of the locations was equally good for drainage.

Under the law the Board of Charities have to approve the plans of the new jail buildings and as soon as plans can be prepared they will be submitted to the board.
