A unique and handsome monument has just been placed over the grave of Mrs. Newton Lightner, in the Lancaster cemetery, the memorial tribute of husband and son.

The shield in gable of right arm is at present blank. The roof, composed of bronze and rose metal is the main feature and is worthy of a detailed description. All the roofplates are of bronze & inch thick, upon the apex of which runs a rich rose-metal ridge piece terminating at each gable in a fleur-de-lis very finely moulded and in high relief. Upon the roof-plates, two inches from the eaves, runs an exceed ingly beautiful four-inch border of purest gothic tracery moulded in rose metal thick and secured at angle pieces by Maltese crosses and bolts of copper.

The conception of this fine work originating with James H. Lightner, son of Newton Lightner, has been elaborated and carried out from the drawings, and under the super-intendance of Mr. W. H. Colson, representative in this country of Messra, Cox Sons, Buckley & Co., of London, England, whose works in all matters appertaining to ecclesi stical art are well known in all parts of the

Mr. Colson, desirous of having the exclusive personal supervision of the work, has used and employed nene but American labor and

The erection of this monument, com posed, as it is of so many parts, differing in material, size and form, was in itself a work requiring practical intelligence and nice me chanical skill. This has been well accom plished by Wm. Crowe, a machinist in the employ of Mr. Jno. McLein of New York, who erected the brass work, aided through out by Haldy & Son and their chief work men Danl. F. Eberman and A. J. Gilgore by whom the marble pieces were most carefully and neatly fitted into place.
