He said that he was born in Warsaw, Hun-gary, in 1791, and is therefore 96 years of agr. He was one of the 500 exiles who came to this country with Kossuth in 1851. He left that city upon obtaining a position as drill master at When the war broke out he left a note behind him to his scholars which "Good bye. I go to the war. He read, "Good bye. I go to the war. He served almost four years in the 101st Regiment Pennsylvania volunteers and after the war was captain of the police of San Fran-Napoleon at the battles of Austerlitz, Leipsic Moscow and at Waterloo.
