MAINE LIQUOR LAW BEATEN.

Imported Whisky Sold Openly in Augusta the Original Packages. The prohibitory law of Maine has just resived a most terrific setback in this vicinity. The people are everywhere discussing the new phase put on the liquor question by the recent action of Michael Burns, a well known recent action of Augusta, Me., who has brought to Augusta from Liverpool, a large invoice of foreign distilled spirits which he is selling to all who wish to purchase. He closed his shop in March last and left for Liverpool, a large to the augusta he appeared into pagediations with one selling to all who wish to purchase. He closed his shop in March last and left for Liverpool, where he entered into negotiations with one of the largest importing houses in that city for an unlimited supply of all kinds of distilled spirits. The United States protects all persons importing liquors from foreign countries from prosecution under any state probibitory law for selling such goods in the original unbroken packages, and the dealer has landed in Augusta an advance lot of Irish whisky and Jamaica rum. The goods came through the Portland custom house and arrived there by freight. When the goods reached the depot they were loaded upon a cart and hauled through the streets, the police looking upon the scene with wildly staring eyes. It was an unusual thing to witness the transportation of liquor through the city in broad daylight, and of course it attracted great attention. The store is now stocked with the goods, and they are piled up in windows before the admiring gase of all opponents of the prohibitory law. The retail price of the goods has been made so low as to be in easy reach of the purchasing public, and the sales have already been very large. The cflicers are surprised at the affair and every lawyer in town has been engaged in looking up the law bearing upon the sale of imported liquors in their original packages.
