The second quarterly conference of the Dake street M. E. church was held Monday evening with Presiding Elder Rev. John F. Crouch in the chair. There was a very full attendance of male members. After the regular business of the conference had been transacted the matter of building a new church edifice, which has been discussed at business meetings of the congregation, was brought before the conference by a motion that a committee of seven be appointed in accordance with the rules of discipline to essertain and report to the male members of the church the advisability of erecting a new the church the advisability of erecting a new church edifice together with the best location for it, the style of building proposed and the A long discussion ensued in which con-

church building was developed by several of the most influential and wealthy of the mem-bers. They argued that there was no pres-ent necessity for a new church building, as the present edifice if certain repairs were made would accommodate the congregation for years to come.

On the other hand it was argued that the old church building was entirely too small to seat the families of members and the large congregations generally in attendance; that the Sunday school department especially was unsuited to its purposes, being not only too small and poorly lighted, but being un-healthful, owing to its dampness, low cellings and want of proper ventilation. It was argued that the old church edifice was not at ail in keeping with the handsome residences of many of the members, and that the con-gregation can well afford to build a new one.

The motion for the appointment of a committee as above proposed was carried by a large majority, and the chair appointed the following as said committee: Rev. J. R. T. Gray, Samuel Myers, Robert M. Morrow, D P. Bitner, Joseph Selvert, Dr. Henry Yeagley and C. S. Burns. From the general tenor of the discussion it appeared that if a new church edifice of suitable size and modern style of architecture

were erected, the cost would not be less that \$50,000. The church discipline provides that before any positive action can be taken for the erection of new churches the probable cost must be ascertained, and three-fourths of the whole amount must be subscribed by substantial and responsible members. If the Duke street congregation were united in tavor of building a new church there would be no diffitulty in raising \$50,000, as the con gregation is a wealthy one; but it happens that several of the most wealthy are opposed to the project, and it may therefore fall if they fail to subscribe liberally. After the committee shall have reported, a vigorous attempt will be made to raise the necessary
