> BRATING THE BECORD. ing Hanchback Who Was the Father ading Times.

"I read a low days ago," said a member o man in Western Pennsylvania who died the father of thirty-three children at the age of ninety-six. When John Heffner, of Reading, was accidentally killed in Lancaster in 1886, at the age of sixty-nine, he was the lather of forty-one children the lather of forty-one children, and a step-child also called him father. Heffner was one of Resding's characters, and was in the full vigor of health when he was killed. It is doubtful it his record in the was one of Reading's characters, and was in the full vigor of health when he was killed. It is doubtful it his record in the paternal line was ever equalled. Heffner was a dwarfed hunchback. He was born in Beriin in 1816, and came to this country in 1845, settling in Reading. Until his death he made a living by collecting and selling mage and paper. His remarkable family history is part of the records of the Berks country courts, it having been elicited a short time before his death while he was a witness in a lawauit. He was married first in 1846. In eight years his wife bore him 17 children. The first and second years of their marriage she gave birth to twins. For four successive years afterwards she bore triplets. In the seventh year she gave birth to one child, and died soon afterwards of the 17 children she left, consequently the oldest was only seven years of age. Haffner engaged a young woman to look after his large brood of bables, and three months later she became the second with two children the first two years. Five years later she had added 10 more to the hamily, two at every birth. Then for three years as added but one a year. She died before another year came round. Of the 32 children that John Heffner had been premeted with 12 had died. The 20 that were left, however, did not appear to be any chingle to a young widow with one child consenting to become the third wife of the joily little hunchback—for he was known as one of the happinest and incest genial men in Reading, although it kept him toiling like a slave to keep his score of mouths in bread. The third Mrs. Heffner became the mother of nine children to her husband in ten years, and the contentiment and happiness of the couple were proverbial. One day in the fall of 1885 the father of the 41 children was crossing the Reading track and was run down by a locomotive and instantly killed.
