

STREET EXTENSION.

Another Twenty Street Extension Upon The City. At noon to-day Lancaster was visited by a heavy fall of rain, accompanied by rather phenomenal thunder and lightning.

The electric light pole corner of Orange and Charlotte streets was struck. The pole was shattered, the lamp broken and the battery burned out. Other poles and lamps on the same line were more or less injured.

The chimney of a house 315, North Charlotte street, was struck and some slate was torn from the roof of the building. Damage slight.

Dr. S. H. Metzger had tied his horse to a post in front of the Rohrer house, on East Chestnut street, near North Queen. The lightning struck near by, stunned the horse, causing him to fall and break a shaft and demolish the dashboard of the phaeton.

John Katz, grocer, on High street, was slightly injured by lightning, which took effect on his barn. The house of John Creshaw, 307 North Mulberry street, was struck and several bricks knocked from the top of the chimney.

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HOW DID SHE DIE?

Miss Feltz, Street Light Erected Over Mrs. Jane Markey, wife of Lawrence Markey, died on July 10, at her residence near Nine Points, in Bart township. Her body was kept the usual length of time and interred in a coffin at 9 o'clock in the morning, in a graveyard where were buried a number of relatives.

Some days after the funeral it began to be whispered in the neighborhood that Mrs. Markey had not died a natural death, but had come to her death by being poisoned, and the name of a relative was mentioned as the party who had administered the fatal dose.

These rumors finally reached the ears of Capt. I. H. Keen, the deputy coroner of the district. He at once communicated the rumors to Coroner Keen, who immediately sought the advice of District Attorney Weaver and after deliberating over the matter it was decided to fully investigate the rumors.

The district attorney prepared a letter to the approval of the coroner, and sent it to Deputy Keen. In that letter Keen was instructed to confer with Attorney Weaver, and to ascertain whether or not the rumor that Mrs. Markey was poisoned was true.

This letter was sent to Deputy Keen in the early part of the week and an answer was expected to reach this city to-day, but up to the hour of going to press none had been received.

There is no motive as yet known to the authorities here for the poisoning, if the woman met her death in that way; all the district attorney now desires since the rumors were reported to him is that there shall be a full investigation, and if the rumors cannot be substantiated that the matter shall be dropped, and if there is sufficient foundation the body will be exhumed and examined by physicians.

THE EMANCIPATION PROCLAMATION. Features of the Celebration to be Held Here Tomorrow. The first emancipation celebration by the colored people of this city next Thursday promises to be a success. A large number of invitations have been sent to Harrisburg, Philadelphia, Reading, Columbia, Middletown, Steelton and other places, and a large number of visitors are expected to participate.

In the morning at 10 o'clock the parade will form on Low street, right resting on Rockland. The route of march is from Rockland to North, to Strawberry, to South Queen, to Vine to Prince, to West King, to Mulberry, to Chestnut, and at Sheriff's cemetery a halt will be made when an address will be delivered by Edward Meilen at the grave of Thaddeus Stevens.

Forming in line march will continue to Chestnut, to North Queen, to Centre Square and to Tell's Hall. Prominent speakers will be there, among them Hon. A. B. Wilson and E. Cary, of Philadelphia, J. W. Simpson, of Harrisburg, and Edward Meilen, of this city. In the evening a ball will be held.

Besides the grand ball, there will be two or three others. One of the prominent men at the head of the celebration says the banners to be carried in the parade will be a great feature of it.

Windfall Scott, through Marriott Brothers, has brought suit against the Pennsylvania railroad for damages. Scott shipped some meat over the railroad which was delayed by the wreck at Rohrer's near a few weeks ago. The meat reached Philadelphia late for market and was spoiled before it could be used.
