Bargiar-Proof Door Fastever Prof. C. W. Lippott has secured a patent on an invention of his own, which he calls a "burglar-proof door-fastener." The principle on which it works is very simple. The invention consists of a book and thumbioint screw attachment to be placed on the key of a door. It frequently happens that burglars secure entrance to a house by twisting from without the key of the door left sticking in the lock from the inside. Mr. Lippott's in

vention prevents the moving of the key in either direction, and the attachment on the key is capable of sustaining an eighty-pound pressure. It is quite small and neat and can be carried in the vest pocket. When a door is looked from the inside and this attachment placed on the key, the housekeeper may rest assured that he is safe from inon by the turning of the key in the lock by some one from the outside.


