THE OROUNDS AT M'GRANN'S PARK BRING PUT INTO BRADINASS.

Many Workmon There Getting Things Into Shape-Laying Of the Spaces Purchas By the Venders of Goods-Arrival of

Horees and Showmen.

About the busiest place in this city at the present time is, McGrann's park, where the most extensive preparations are being made for the great fair, which will open on next Monday. Everything is bustle and confusion at present, and the grounds are alive with

workmen of all kinds actively engaged. In the main building merchants and others are busy arranging their stands for their exhibits and large quantities of goods are being taken to the park. City

Regulator Slaymaker is marking out the spaces that have been sold to hucksters, showmen and others and many of the pur-chasers are at work. The large tent for the display of flowers, fruits, da, is being erected on the tennis grounds. Many improvements have been made at the park since last season and there will much more room for exhibitors. The display of live stock will be very fine, and for the ac commodation of the animals almost two hundred additional stalls will be put up by the opening day. Just north of the large exhibition building big frame structure has been erected and will e used as a restaurant where meals will be furnished. On the north end of it is a refreshment stand. A large force of workmen,

under the direction of W. K. Beard, are moving the frame building formerly used as ble, which stood in the south eastern

NEW YORK, Aug. 25 -A special cable lispatch to the New York Herald from Dublin savs :

Mr. E. Dwyer Gray, member of Parlis ment and editor of the Freeman's Journal contributes editorially this remarkable com-parison of the lives of Grattan and Parnell : "Following are striking coincidences o date and fact : Grattan was born in 1746 Parnell exactly a contury later ; Grattan entered the Irish Parliament in 1775 ; Parnell took his seat in the House of Common

"In 1779 was established that body led by Grattan which enabled him to achieve legis-lative independence, while in 1859 was founded that organization of which Parnelli is leader, and which bids fair to enable him is leader, and which bids fair to enable him also to regain legislative independence. The ireedom of Dublin was presented to Grattan, and exactly a century later the same compil-ment was conferred on Parnell. Both were Protestants. Grattan attached himself to Fox, who visited Ireland in 1778; Parnell to Gladstone, who visited Ireland in 1878, "A golden tribute from a grateful people was presented to both. Grattan boucht an






