QLAT AND MINELBYOWN TURNPIER. ewers Filed in the Equity Bull Brought by

Ephranto Supervisors.

A few weeks ago Levi Schload and Jacob G. Shaeffer, supervisors of Ephran township, filed a bill in equity against the Clay and Hiskietown turnpike company. It set forth that the company had appropriated to its use part of a public road in Ephrans township. chip for turnpike purposes, but before doing so were bound to pay the sums of money expended by the township in keeping the road appropriated in repair.

The turnpike company on Monday filed an answer to the bill. The substance of it is as follows:

The company had full authority in law and under its letters patent to enter upon, appropriate, and use the whole of said road, to the extent and in the manner it has done: and, moreover, that the plaintiffs have no legal status in this suit to impeach the right of the defendant to locate its turnpike road on the bed of the public road in Ephrata township taken for that purpose; that the plaintiffs cannot have and maintain the said bill in conity, because the applicate matter sought to

purpose; that the plaintiffs cannot have and maintain the said bill in equity, because the subject matter sought to be determined in this suit has been finally adjudicated by the court of quarter sessions of Lancaster county, on petition of plaintiffs, for a decree of said court for the removal of the toil gates of said turppike road, and to compel the defendant to cease collecting thereon until the defendant, the Clay & Hinkletown Turnpike company, had reunded to said plaintiffs, the supervisors of Eubrata township, the money expended by them in the maintenance and repair of said road; the claim made in said petition being for the same amount and for the same matter as is now claimed in the plaintiffs bill. That the said court of quarter sessions, after full discussion and mature deliberation, on October 1, 1894, entered its final judgment and decree as follows, to wit: "We are of opinion that the Clay and Hinkletown Turnpike company is not in law liable to said township for the amount it claims, and is not in law liable croound to pay to the supervisors of said township any sum of money, expended for any work and labor, done or paid for, by said township in keeping in good order or repair, after its abandonment by the company, the said Downingtown, Kphrata and Harrisburg turspike road. We therefore dismiss said petition for that reason at the cost of petitionera."


