

CHRISTIAN SIPLE DEAD.

Arrival of John St. Clair's body. The body of John St. Clair, who died in New Brighton, arrived in Lancaster this morning at 6 o'clock. It was taken by Undertaker A. C. Rotto to the residence of the brother of deceased, on Mulberry street, from which place the funeral will be held on Monday afternoon. Mr. St. Clair was a member of the Cigar-makers' Union and the members in this city are invited to attend the funeral. The deceased leaves two children, a boy and a girl, instead of one, as mentioned yesterday.

COLUMBIA, March 23.—On Wednesday afternoon Christian Siple, an employee of the Susquehanna rolling mill, was badly injured about his head by being thrown against a wall. He was standing near a door, which was blown inward by a gust of wind. He was rescued to his home on South Fourth street, near Union, in a wagon, and his condition was not thought to be serious. About 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon he suddenly became worse and the attending physician stated that he was in a dying condition. He remained comatose until 4:30 o'clock when he expired. Mr. Siple was born in Helfstedt, Germany, over 61 years ago, and left that country in 1854 for the United States, coming directly to Columbia. He was employed at the ironworks about here for a number of years, and then found employment at the Susquehanna rolling mill, where he has been employed for the past eighteen years. A wife and four children survive. His children are Henry, William, Maggie and Sarah Siple, all living in town. The funeral will be held on Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock; services in St. Paul's Lutheran church, on Locust street.

The dam to be repaired. The damage to the Columbia dam by the recent ice gorge has been so extensive that the much newspaper comment, especially in the Harrisburg papers. It has been said that the dam is doomed and will not be repaired. This gave the up-river people much joy, but they are very much mistaken. The damage is not as great as many people would desire. It has been injured in the portion known as the old dam, where the break is about one hundred and thirty-five feet in length. The water has washed out the center abutment, but it is thought that the wood work is unimpaired. Messrs. Edward N. Smith, chief engineer of the Reading company, and A. D. F. Shure, superintendent of the Susquehanna and Tide Water canal, have been in town to look at the damage and stated that the dam will be put in good order. They made a tour of inspection and found the dam from the ways to the Columbia more damaged to the extent above stated, while the dam from the fishways to the York county shore remains intact.

The work of repair will commence as soon as possible and Mr. Smith stated that some would be used for ballast instead of stones. It will require about 50,000 tons of stone to complete the work. The good news of the action of the Reading company is a source of great satisfaction in town.
