At present there is a great raid upon At present there is a great raid upon the baking powder market, and so many impure and adulterated articles of this kind have been found peddled about the country that the authorities in several of the states have taken the neces-sary action to expose them. The report of the Ohio State Food commission has shown that a large number of the baking powder sold here are made from alum, phosphates or a cheap and adulterated cream of tartar. The danger to the public is made still The danger to the public is made still greater by the unblushing effrontery with which the proprietors of these impure powders advertise them as perfect, claiming for them all kinds of talse and impossible

The official report of the Ohio State food commission gives the names of a number of these impure powders, and the amount
