DANA GRAHAM DRAD The Well-Known Comb Manufacturer &

cumbs After a Long Itiners, Another well-known citizen of Lancaste has passed away. Dana Graham died at his residence, corner of West James and forth Prince street, shortly before 9 o'clock Saturday evening. He had been ill for the past seven months and was confined to his room most of that time. One occasion that brought him from his room was the celebration of his 40th wedding anniversary on January 19. His system was generally broken up, but his principal affection was nervousness of the stomach. He had been sinking for several days past and became remaining in that condition to the time of

Deceased was born in Laominster, Mass. m May 9th, 1821. He was a son of Samuel Graham, a cooper, and the oldest of twelve children. At the age of 16 years he began learning the trade of a comb-maker n his native place. He then started in usiness for himself and remained in it for three years. On October 25th, 1850, he came to Lancaster and the same year built the factory on West James street. In 1851, with the late John Schaffner, he started in the manufacture of combs. They were in partnership for 20 years and in 1870 Mr. chaffner died. Mr. Graham continued the business alone until 1881, when he took bis son John into partnership. Since that the firm has been carrying on the business at the same place. They manufacture combs of all kinds, shipping them to every part of the country. Mr. Graham was married January 19:h.

During the reign of the old volunteer fire department Mr. Graham was president of the Washington company No. 4, for a number of years. It was while he held that office that the old engine was purchased. In politics Mr. Graham was Republican and erved several terms in council from the Ninth ward. He was also the first alderman ever elected in that ward. Mr. Graham erected the large and handsome residence in which he died.
