The physi-cians found that the third vertebrase of the neck was fractured and dislocated The reason that death did not soon was that the fracture did not press pon any vital part. Death was certain, owever, and only a question of time when t would occur. There have been cases where ersons with similar injuries have lived for several days, or even a week. While Mr. King was lying bedfast five similar cases occurred, in which the injured persons died in a very short time. Denny Mach's injury was of the same kind, and he lived but six hours. The case of the physicians who made the autopsy will bring it to the attention of the Medical society at the; meeting on Wednesday when a more detailed account of it will be giver.
