BOOK AGENTS IN THE BASTILE,

Two Men Who Apparently Travel With th Idea of Finding How Many Hotel-Kerpers They Can Swindle. Two men who are supposed to be profes sional hotel beats, were arrested on Thurs-day by Constables Barnhold and Wittlek and are now in prison here. On Mon day of last week these two individuals, who were rather well dressed, came to Lancas ter and registered at the Grape hotel. They rave their names as John J. Benchoff and A. Moore, and claimed to be selling Chambers' Encyclopedia, a history of the world, and works of Dickens and Bulwer. They spent the whole of last week here and ed to the Rishell Brothers, the new proprietors of the Grape, to be doing con-siderable business. They had a satchel between them and some books. Saturday morning both left the hotel taking that they were going out to can-vass. Before noon Benchoff came back to the hotel, and at the office tried to sell one of the proprietors Dickens' works. While Rishell stepped out of the office for a short time. Benchoff managed to get his value out of the office and disappeared. on Atlantic Express at 11:30, and went to Philadelphia. The next heard of them was when they turned up in Columbia, on Monday afternoon. They then had with them a rather attractive looking woman who claimed to be Benchoff's wife. So suspiciously did they act when they first struck that town they were taken for bunco men, and were so written up by the Columbia reporters of the Lancaster daily papers. They finally went to the Franklin house where they stopped up to Thursday. Barnhold and Wittick were given the matter in charge by Mr. Rishell, and on Thursday afternoon they found that Moore was in this city. They kept track of him for a time, and finally went to Columbia to

look for Benchoff. At the Franklin house they found that Moore had disappeared, leaving behind in his room a valise in which there was a dirty celluloid collar. During the afternoon Benchoff left the hotel, saying that he intended going to Marietta and Wrightsville. Instead of asking the porter of the hotel he secured another attache of the house to take his valise to the depot. When Mr. Slade, the proprietor of the hotel, learned this he had the valles brought back to the hotel. The officers kept their eyes on the woman who when she left the hotel for the railroad station they followed her. At Brubaker's hotel they found their man, who was hiding behi d a door. They took him into custody and brought him and the woman to this city. The latter was inclined to be very saucy and spoke her mind to the When Benchoff was saked where Moore was, he said that he was working in Marietta or Wrightsville where he had intended going. The officers arrived in this city with the man and woman about half past four o'clock on the train which comes here just before Day Express. Upon arriving here the officers found Moore standing behind the door in Zortman's restaurant in the station. He seemed to be await-

ing the arrival of the train. Upon inquiry the officers learned that he had been in the restaurant all afternoon. He told the bartender that he had but five cents and with that he tried to "work" numerous drinks. Moore was also taken into custody and his two friends seemed some-

what surprised at his capture. The two prisoners went to a telegraph office and sent a message to Philadelphia for money to square themselves. They also visited the Grape hotel and made a btuff at John D. Rishell, one of the proprietors, by telling him that he might have known better than to think that they would not pay their bill at his house. The men were finally placed in Jail and the woman was lef

at the Grape. The impression is that the accused had made all arrangements to beat Mr. Slade, they had the Grape, out of his bill, and avoid suspicion Moore first came to Lanaster to await the arrival of his companions and then take the train for Phila-
