THE HOUSE DESERTED.

Doors of the Grape Close After the Sheriff Selis the Lease's Furnishings.

Sheriff Burkholder closed out the sale of the stock, fixtures and furniture of the Grape hotel Tuesday afternoon, and to-day the hotel presents a picture of desolation. All the furniture has been carried away by the respective purchasers. The bar is closed, and the long entries and scores of sleeping rooms are tenantiess. The dining room, which a week ago was so pretilly furnished, is as bare as a barn floor, the kitchen fires have been drawn, and the boarders have sought other quarters. boarders have sought other quarters.

The Grape hotel was one of the oldest in

the city, having been built upon a lot in 1741. This was purchased at sheriff's sa @ by Adam Reigart in 1769, and has been run tinuously by many landlords from that day to this, the most coaspicuous of whom were the Michaels, and the latest of whom was John D. Risheil, late of Centre county. The boarders in the Loeb building, which

for some years past has been an annex of the Grape, continue to occupy their sleeping apartments (they having their own furniture), but get their board at other hotels and boarding houses.

Major Bowell, the trustee for Mrs.

Michael, who owns the property, says he has no certain knowledge what the outcome of the trouble will be, but be offers to less the property to any good tenant if he can get one. The furniture and fixtures sold for low figures, the entire sum received by the

sheriff being \$678 58.

HAVANA'S PRIGHTFUL BURRICANE. One Hundred and Forty-seven Lives Known

to Have Been Lost. Particulars of the late hurricane in Cuba, are coming in. La Pepilla el Ingles and Manazas plantations were totally demolished, 500 head of cattle were drowned and seven lives lost. The loss is calculated at over \$1,000,000. At Las Lajas, in the Laberinto district, every house Lejas, in the Laberinto district, every house being of wood was thrown down. All the pisntations in Clabszar, ten miles from Havana, were totally demolished. The sea rose to such an extent that the inhabitants were obliged to fies for ills. All the tobacco fields in this territory were badly damaged by sait water. At Paimilias, near Mantanzas, nearly every house was demolished. At the Banaguises station, near Cardenas, the wind carried away the railroad station.

Carraillic, near Sagua, was flooded.

The inhabitants obtained a large boat, nto which the women and children were into which the women and children were put, numbering twenty-two, including an old man and his son. While the others were in the boat father and son were pushing it, wading until the water got too deep, when the poor old man, being completely exhausted, attempted to climb into the boat, which was overroiled and sunk in twenty feet of water. All hands were less toxoepting the son. The total number of bodies recovered as reported to the government from cities and towns heard from to date is 147.
