The Five Million Gallon Pump Now in Oper

The water commission and the water imnent committee visited the new water works Monday afternoon and found the 5,000,000 galion Worthington pump in suc-cessful operation, running 70 strokes per minute. With the exception that some parts of the machinery needed a little tightening up, the new works appeared to be working perfectly. The pressure was 77 pounds compared with 84 pounds at the old works. The mayor gave it as his opinion that a greater volume of water was being thrown from the top of the standpipe in the reservoir than he had ever before

Without removing the 6,000,000 gallon pump from the old water works, the " high duty" attachments will be added to it after which the pump will be taken spart and removed to the new works.
