

TEXT OF SEVERAL OPINIONS.

Want Justice Green's Case of the Case of the Pennsylvanian railroad company vs. Ball, error to common pleas court in Lancaster county, in which the lower court's judgment was reversed, are as follows:

This was a case wherein a man was killed by being struck by the steps on a Pennsylvanian railroad car; the widow sued for damages and obtained a verdict. The justice claims that from the evidence presented the case was not a case of negligence and was a case of contributory negligence.

Justice Williams filed an opinion in the judgment on the demurrer filed by the commonwealth in the case of Fitzpatrick, of Lackawanna county, who was tried for murder. After his case had been in the hands of the jury for five days, the last day being the last day of the term of court, the jury failed to reach a verdict and were discharged by the presiding judge.

The commonwealth filed a demurrer in which they raised the question as to whether the facts set forth in defendant's special plea show that he had been stricken by lightning and discharged against him, and also as to whether his case came under the constitutional provision, "that no person can for the same offense be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb," contending that the judge had no power to discharge the jury until they had found a verdict either for conviction or acquittal.

Justice Williams affirms the judgment of the court below in his decision on the demurrer and says: "The mere inability of the jury to agree in a few hours or days is not such a necessity. There was a mistake on the part of the court in closing the trial without a verdict, which the court cannot correct. The sequence is that a defendant, charged with taking the life of a fellow man goes out of court and out of the reach of justice, because of a mistake in law, made after an honest effort to be right. But the constitutional provision is plain and its enforcement by the courts has been uniform."

The Whitechapel Murderer. An inquest was held in London on the body of the woman found murdered in a narrow court off Berners street Sunday morning.

A sister of the victim was called, and deposed that she awoke at 12:00 o'clock Sunday morning and heard kisses and a sound which she thought was made by a person falling to the ground. She was convinced that her sister was dead, and, after reading the accounts of the murder in the newspapers, went to the morgue and recognized the body of the murdered woman as that of her sister. The house in which the witness resides is several miles from Berners street. The murder was committed about 12:00 o'clock Sunday morning.

The trunk of a woman was found in a recess of the new police office on the Thames embankment on Tuesday afternoon. The head, arms and legs were missing. The remains, which were in an advanced state of decomposition, were wrapped in rough cloth and tightly bound with cord. It is believed that the arms recently found at Plumico and Lambeth were cut from this body.

Burglary at New Providence. QUARREYVILLE, Oct. 2. - Last night burglar broke into the smith shop of Abram Dennis, New Providence, and stole therefrom a brace, bit and other tools. From there they went to Martin Sensenig's store and sawed the panel out of the front door and broke the French plate glass in the name door. An far from being satisfied to discover this, the burglars then proceeded to the store of J. M. McGuffey, of Clearwater, Pa., and stole tobacco, cigars and other articles. There is no suspicion of who committed the burglary, and in the manner in which the entrance was effected the thieves are not believed to have been professional.

Patronesses' New Mass. During the Christmas holidays Lancaster is to have a musical treat. Rev. Father Gahan, formerly of this city, has been pastor of the Catholic church at Milton, one of the finest musicians in the state and has attracted much attention by his work as a composer. For years he has been working on a mass which he has just completed. He is arranging to have it rendered for the first time in St. Mary's church on Christmas morning. The choir of that church has already begun the preliminary work of rehearsal, under the direction of the author. It will be a musical rendition that will attract attention here as well as abroad and will not doubt open up a broad field for the composer.

Good News From Indiana. Councilman George Frick, of the Eighth ward, received a letter from Martin Boyer, a large cigar dealer living in Bowling Green, Indiana. After writing about some business matters, Mr. Boyer concluded with a paragraph on the political situation in Harrison's own state. Mr. Boyer is a Republican, was postmaster of that town, and was removed at the beginning of this administration. He states that there is a political revolution all through Indiana and without question Cleveland and Thurman will carry the state by a large majority.

Sale of City Property. The properties belonging to the estate of Mrs. Ball were offered at public sale at the Leopard hotel, last evening, by Auctioneer Haines. The dwelling house, corner of East King and Ann, and the two lots adjoining on East King street, were withdrawn at \$5,310; the one-story brick house on East King street, adjoining above lots, fronting 17 feet 9 inches, was sold to A. M. Sander for \$1,100, and a dwelling house adjoining, fronting 16 feet 6 inches, to John E. Snyder for \$1,025. Five lots of ground on Ann street, each fronting 20 feet, were sold to Myers & Rathfon, at \$200 each.
