TEXT OF SEVERAL OPINIONS. What Justice Green Says of the Case of the

P. R. R. v. Bell. The points of Justice Green's opinion in

the case of the Pennsylvania railroad company va. Bell, error to common pleas court of Lancaster county, in which the lower sourt's judgment was reversed, are as fel-OWS:

This was a case wherein a man was killed This was a case wherein a man was killed by being struck by the steps on a Pennsyl-wink railroad passenger train; his widow used for damages and obtained a verdict. The justice claims that from the evidence examined the deceased went out of the station and waiked along between the tracks to eatch the train which was ap-proaching, and that he was in such close proximity that he was struck. The engine's headinght at the time was lit, and had he looked he must necessarily have seen the train approach and could have gotten out of the way.

Result of a Jury's Disagreement.

Justice Williams filed an opinion in the judgment on the demurrer filed by the common wealth in the case of Fitzpatrick, of Lackawanna county, who was tried for murder. After his case had been in the bands of the jury for five days, the last day being the last day of the term of court, the jury failed to arree and were discharged by he presiding judge. The case was called at the next term of court. The defendant made a special plea that a further trial was barred by the action of the judge in dis-charging the jury before they found a ver-dict. The case was argued and decided in favor of the defendant, who was dis-charged. The common wealth filed a demurrer in which they raised the question as to whether mmon wealth in the case of Fitzpatrick,

which they raised the question as to whether the facts set forth in defendant's special plea show that he had been in jeopardy for the offense charged against him, and also as to Cherese charged against him, and also as to whether his case came under the constitu-tional provision, "that no person can for the same offense be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb," contending that the judge had no power to discharge the jury until they had found a verdict either for convic-tion or acquittal. Justice Williams affirms the indement of the court below in his

the judgment of the court below in his decision on the demurrer and says: "In capital cases the court has no power to discharge a jury without the consent of the defendant unless an absolute necessity. The mere inability of the jury to agree in a few hours or days is not such a necessity. few hours or days is not such a necessity. There was a mistake on the part of the court in closing the trial without a verdict, which the court cannot correct. The con-nequence is that a defendant, charged with taking the life of a fellow man goes out of court and out of the reach of justice, be cause of a mistake in law, made after an honest effort to be right. But the constitu-itonal provision is plain and its enforce-ment by the courts has been uniform."
