derfer On Trial for Conspiracy.

Thursday Afternoon.—W. U. Hensel, eq., finished his speech in the Thomes P. Bradenbaugh involuntary manslaughter case at noon. J. Hay Brown, esq., made the closing speech for the detense, and District Attorney Weaver for the common-wealth. After being instructed as to the law in the case, the jury at 4:30 o'clock retired to deliberate, and had not agreed upon a verdict when court adjourned.

Frank W. Baum, of Paradise township, was put on trial for stealing balf a dozen chickens from the barn of Charles Hall, living in Sadsbury township. The commonwealth proved that the theft was committed on the night of July 10th. On this night Samuel Conover, a boy in the employ of Hall, slept in the barn and he was awakened towards morning by some one striking a match in the barn. By the light from the match he saw two men, one of whom he was positive was Frank Baum, the defendant. The man unknown lifted the chickens from the rocat and handed them to Baum. The next morning this boy told his employer what he had seen, complaint was made and Baum was ar-

The defendant denied having committed the theft or to baying been on Hali's premises on the night the chickens were stolen. On that night he claimed to have been at home. He also testified that he had conversations with Conover and the boy told him that he could not identify the man be naw stealing the chickens.

In rebuttal the commonwealth showed that the defendant agreed to keep Conover all winter for nothing if he testified to his innocepes. Jury out. Friday Morning -The jury in the case

of common wealth vs. Thos. F. Bradenbaugh, indicted for involuntary manslaughter, rendered a verdict of guilty, and recommended the defendant to the mercy of the court. The jury agreed upon that verdict after a deliberation of three hours. Counsel for accused gave notice that reasons for a new

In the case of commonwealth vs. Frank Baum, charged with chicken stealing, the jury rendered a verdict of not guilty. Horace N. Biemederter and Jerome J. Biemsderfer, partnere, doing business as H. N. Biemsderfer & Bro., were put on

trial on five charges of conspiracy to defraud. The defendants carried on the business of cigarmaking at Liutz, and the s legations of the commonwealth are that they purchased large quantities of leaf to In this city, Philadelphia and Reading. This tobacco was shipped to the firm at Littiz during last full and winter. The greater portion of this tobacco was reehipped, in some cases without reloading, by the firm to Samuel Biemederfer at Petersburg, to whom they sold it for cash, at a loss of several cents per pound. This tobacco was purchased on notes at three, four and five months. Before the maturity of the notes judgment was confessed by the members of the firm, in favor of their father, the defendants were sold out by the sheriff and all the other creditors were left. The firms defrauded were Kendig & Co., Skiles & Frey and Daniel A. Mayer, of this city, Julius Vetteriein & Co., of Philadelphia, and H. B. Bausman, of Reading. The tobacco was purchased by the firm at marked weight and sold to Samuel Biemensderfer at its actual weight, making a loss to the firm in addition the difference of price between the buying and seiling, of several deliars per case. In all about 221 cases of tobacco were purchased by the Bismensderfers on credit and sold to Samuel Blemensderfer for cash an undervaluation.

the time the goods were purchased. the Blemsderfers represented themselves as owners of real estate worth \$5,000, and with only \$1,000 business debts, in addition to small liens against their homes. Only One witness (a representative of Julius Vetteriein & Co.) had been examined on the part of the commonwealth up to the hour of adjournment. The trial will probably last the balance of the week.
