Previous to his arrival the town had been covered with bills announcing that the "President of the Great English Staff of Physicians and Surgers consisting of fourteen in number geon, consisting of fourteen in number, will room at the City hotel on the 28th of September." The circular set forth that every kind of disease and deformity would be treated. Invalids that were incurable would be rejected and others would be treated free of charge. The number of cases treated in England and every prominent city of this county were given. The man above refered to is the so-called "President" and he registered himself "A. Soper, London, England," As soon as he had taken a room patients began to "A. Soper, London, England." As soon as he had taken a room patients began to flock to him and most of them were people of the poorer class in this city and county. The "doctor," dressed in a long black gown and with a mortar on his head, solemnly received the patients. Upon his arrival in town he had procured several bushel baskets full of bottles. In them he placed a black mixture, and on every bottle was pasted the same label. Soper pretended to cure everything and especially the diseases of persons who had money. He told the people that he would treat them free for three months, but he sired them to purchase his medicine. For this he secured almost fabulous prices and in other ways he obtained arge sums of money. In a few days while h re he had \$500 in small money changed into \$100 bills, at different times. Early this week he skipped and the number of people that he beat is now only being learned. Yesterday one man who had paid him \$17.50 for future treatment, called at the hotel, and in the evening another turned up who had been nipped for \$14.50, and had secured but a bottle of the black mix-
