

MUST LAY PAVEMENTS.

COUNCIL ORDERS THEIR CONSTRUCTION WITHIN THIRTY DAYS. An Ordinance for the Opening of Second Street Introduced—Reports of the Standing Committees—James D. Slade Retires From Reportorial Work.

COLUMBIA, Oct. 10.—Council met in regular session last evening. Members present Messrs. Bannock, Barry, Green, Jackson, Miller, Stevenson and Wilson. Absent: Messrs. Carroll and Gramer.

The finance committee reported as follows: Balance at last report, \$114 97; Transient market, \$100 00; Store rents, \$25 00; Rent of auditorium, \$100 00; Total, \$349 97. Receipts: From sale of bonds, \$100 00; From sale of stock, \$100 00; From sale of real estate, \$100 00; Total, \$300 00.

The highway committee reported as follows: Plans street laid back from present street south to Alley X, repaired North Second street, between Bridge and Poplar; one building permit issued for a house.

The market committee made their usual report on the markets being in first class condition with good abundance. The market for produce is good and prices are now in good order.

An ordinance was brought up relating to the opening, laying out and grading of Second street from Chestnut to Walnut. Action was postponed for one month.

A petition was presented from residents and merchants doing business on Locust street from Front to Second, asking for an electric light at Bank alley. The petition was referred to the light and water committee.

Chief Burgess Smith reported granting a number of licenses and receiving money for the same. The special police officers during the centennial had done well and were paid off. The report was received and filed.

A bill was received from the Columbia Gas company for \$68.20 for the centennial chamber. As this seemed to be an error the bill was referred to the light and water committee to have it corrected.

The highway committee were instructed to have Chestnut street from Second to Third, and Second street from Bridge to Chestnut, placed in a passable condition for the winter.

The property owners on the north side of Chestnut below Third and west side of Second street will be given 30 days notice to lay brick pavements.
