The men were brought to the railroad hospital and after receiving attention by Dr. Craig were sent home. Both main tracks were blocked and passengers were transferred around the wreck. The wreckers left at 12:30 a. m. Sunday and returned at 3:30 p. m., after clearing away all of the wreck excepting
