JACOB HARTMAN'S DEATH.

It is caused by loss of blood, the result of a gunshot wound.

Jacob Hartman, the young son of Harry Hartman, who is attending private school, while out gunning near E. O'Clock Thursday, died at his home at 10 o'clock this morning, from loss of blood.

The accident occurred at 10 o'clock in the morning and it was some time before any one could be secured to bring the boy to town. He did not reach home until about 11 o'clock.

It was half an hour afterwards before a physician could be secured. The boy began to grow weak soon after he was brought home, but revived in the afternoon.

In the evening he began sinking and died at the time about 11 o'clock. The boy was fifteen years of age and a good steady worker.

He was employed in the brickyard of Jacob Pontz and was popular with his fellow workmen and companions.

Coroner Honeman held an inquest this afternoon and the jury rendered a verdict that death resulted from a gun shot wound inflicted accidentally.

The juror the juror who declined to bring him to town, intemperately permitting him to lie on the ground for nearly two hours, are censurable.
