NEW YORK STATE GIVES MARRISON PLURALITY OF ABOUT 10,000.

Hall Par Gaverner Polls Through and Gree Defeats Howitt-New Jersey Remains in the Democratic Column-Connecticut and Probably Indiana Republicas.

From Wednesday's Supplement.

New York, Nov. 7—2:45 A. M.—Returns scelved at the United Press office by ounties, by the majority which are estima ted, indicate that Harrison has carried New York by about 10,000 plurality.

Complete corrected returns in this city give Cleveland 162,981; Harrison 105,726; Dieveland's mejority 57,255.

The New York Herald this morning says: At the hour of going to press with our first edition the probabilities indicate the election of Gen. Harrison to the presidency.
