AL. SPEER AGAIN IN TROUBLE. He and a Partner Assault a Young Man and Are Held For Court. AL. SPEER, who while a police officer under Mayor Rosenbush assaulted two men and was sent to jail for a term, is again in trouble. It is said that he and Demmell both kicked Huber as he lay on the pavement. Huber and the young lady both testified at the hearing. Demmell denies that he did anything wrong. The alderman gave no decision in the drunken and disorderly conduct case. The prosecutor is determined to push the other charge, as the assault is said to have been made without any cause whatever.

HOW PITTSBURGH LOST A MILLION. Dr. Hostetter's Will in the Favor Torn Up Because of an Official Act. A great deal of surprise has been manifested in Pittsburgh on the supposition that the late Dr. Hostetter died intestate. It was thought inconsistent with his well-known business habits. On Friday the story leaked out that a few weeks ago Dr. Hostetter did make a will, and what is more, it contained a bequest of \$1,000,000 to the city of Pittsburgh for a great art and mechanics hall. This would cost \$1,000,000 and would have been the most elaborate structure of the kind in the United States. The will provided that the doctor's eldest son must be one of the board of directors governing the institution, to be succeeded in turn at death by his eldest son and so on from son to son. Matters had progressed so far that the doctor had examined a site which he thought available for the erection of the art gallery.
