

TO-DAY'S FUNERALS.

Funeral of John T. MacGonigle at St. Mary's Catholic Church. The funeral of Collector John T. MacGonigle, which took place from his late residence on East King street this morning, was the largest seen in this city for many years. It was largely attended by the relatives and friends of the deceased from all parts of the county. Among those present from abroad were Commissioner W. F. Harris, of Philadelphia, and the Lancaster Governor's Guard and the collectors of revenue from the various counties in the Ninth district. The funeral in this city was closed and all the remains were attended in a body. The body was in a heavy metallic casket, on the lid of which was the name and age of the deceased. The only flowers were a wreath of plain white. There were no services at the house and the body was borne to the hearse by six police officers. The pall bearers were W. A. Adams, Michael Haberbusch, Jacob B. Long, George Measener, George K. Reed, S. R. B. Ruppel, W. U. Hines, and William S. Keck. The funeral cortege proceeded to St. Mary's Catholic church, where services were held. Requiem high mass was celebrated by Rev. Dr. P. J. McDonough, with Rev. J. M. McDermott, Philadelphia, as celebrant. Rev. J. M. McDonough of York, as sub-deacon. The choir sang Ohnewald's mass. Dr. McCullough preached the funeral sermon, and read a very high tribute to the deceased. After the service the body was taken to St. Mary's cemetery, where the interment was made.

CHARITABLE BEQUESTS.

The will of Wm. W. Withers, of Eden township, was probated to-day. After making some special bequests, he directs that one-twentieth of his estate shall be given to the Mt. Eden Lutheran church, towards the payment of its debt, and one-twentieth to the board of benevolent mission of the Protestant Episcopal church of Central Pennsylvania. Deceased was the owner of a farm and had considerable personal property.
