Imposed on Two Hotel-Keepers.

Prof. Edward Bushell died at his home, 414 Wilson street, yesterday, aged 75 years. He had not been in good health for some time, and on last Friday was obliged to take to his hed. Mr. Bushell was a native of Ireland, and received his education in that country. He came to America when a young man and settled in Polladelphis, where he studied law and practiced before the bar in that city for many years. He was a man of fine linguistic abilities, was considered a good Hebrew sobolar, and possessed a large fund of varied information.
