op Tolk How He Killed, Anter

Bureauer Schoop Toils How He Mitted, anter gentiting in Philadelphin Last Weer.

Jeob Schoop, the murderer of Auton Shilling, has made a confession to the Philadelphin efficialr.

The most trying ordeal which the murderer was compelled to undergo on Monday was his recognition of the body of the victim at the morgue. His eyes seemed as if they would start from his head, and in other ways Schoop manifested his terror. Hemores evidently occupied a prominent place in his mind, but after being driven from the county dead house he had calmed his fedings to such an extent that he coully asked for and was given a cigar. Throughout the day Special Officer Henry and Detectives Crawford and Geyer busied thermsives in substantisting the tale told by Schoop in the Tenth district station bouse. The contession follows in the language of the assessin:

THE MURDERER'S STATEMENT.

I live at No. 1212 Cadwalader street, and on Tuesday morning, December 25, 1988, about 5 o'clock in the morning, I went into the kitchen and made a fire in the stove. I then opened the closet door and looked for comething to set for my wife, as there had been a half loaf of bread, a pound of sugar, fourteen or fifteen potatoes boiled with their shins on, and some milk that was left after supper on Monday night. To my astomishment I found nothing there. I then called Anton Bebilling, and said to him, "In the name of God, look here. No bread, no milk, no sugar, and a poor sick woman lying up in bed." This conversation was in the kitchen. Anton answered me and said: "I did not take the milk, the bread, or the sugar."

I turned around to him and said, "You — dog." I was very much excited, and struck him a blow with my fist in the temple, which knocked him down. I then went up stairs and told my wife what I had done, as he lay there as though he was dead.

She told me, "I guess you have not killed him if you only struck him with your fist." I then went down stairs again and found him still insensible. My mind was in such a state that I did not know what I was doing. I looked at him and said, "You — dog, if you are deed you might as well have another blow." I picked up a half round piece of wood and struck him another blow on the head. I then said to myself, "What have I done? The man is dead, and what shall I do with him?" I left him lie until about 5 p. m. of that day, and I made up my mind to cut him up and cart him sawy.

I then cut his legs off with a tableknife and a saw, that is in pawn at Germantown road and Girard avenue. I then put them in sacks and tied them up and left them remain in the kitchen. On Wednesday morning, December 26, 1838, about 6:16 o'clock, I went to the stable, got my horse and put the body and the legs in the wagon, and took it to Fairmount park, and put it in an iron pipe. The prisoner said that when he killed Schilling he (Schilling) had on a knit jacket and vest, which were covered with plood. The prisoner took them off the body, washed them out and hung them on the fist. Schoop now asys that instead of leaving the body in the kitchen, after the legs were cut off, "I took them outside and threw them into my ceilar, where they remained until I took them away next morning.
