TWENTY-PIVE BOYS INSANE,

Victime.

Miffliatown Dispatch to the Times.

The remarkable phenomenon of translest insanity, which was discovered yeaterday among the male students of the Modillister-ville soldiers' orphan school, has not yet been explained. The facts so far as reported are as follows: On Tuesday evening Dr. Lucian Banks, of Miffliatowr, veceived word from the medical attendant of the orphan school that a consultation was decided upon a remarkable manifestation of a nervicus aliment which had developed in seventees boys at the school.
