

MAGEE'S WATERLOO.

ONE BILL BE CHAMPIONS IS REJECTING
BY THE HOUSE.

A Member so Withdraw or Postpone the
Benton Lanes Resolution State and It
Is Also Not allowed to Have
Place on the Calendar.

HARRISBURG, April 5.—Friends of Chris-
tus remained last night that there was no
move for the resolution to place the Senate
bill to enable traction companies to lease
railway lines on the House calendar, and
the meeting LaFayette, of Allegheny, asked
members to withdraw the resolution,
which being refused, Graham, of Allegheny,
made a motion to indefinitely postpone.
This motion received only 31 votes, while
300 members voted against it.

Mallory, Democrat, of Philadelphia,
was the only member in the delegation from
that city who supported the motion.

Ten of fifteen members from Allegheny
presented for indefinite postponement.

The defeat of the proposition was followed
by the refusal of the House, by an over-
whelming vote, to place the railway bill on
the calendar.

Schumer, of Fulton, called up a concurrent
resolution providing for a commission to
make payment of claims of the state against
the national government with a view to the
reimbursement of citizens' border counties
for losses sustained by rebel invasion. The
bill passed after incorporation of amendment
limiting the expenses of the commis-
sion to not exceeding \$5,000.

Adjourned until Monday evening.

INCHING ALONG.

A Link of the New Railroad from Lancaster
to the Delaware.

The Philadelphia Inquirer has the fol-
lowing working on the proposed railroad
from Lancaster to the Delaware river in
South County. Yesterday they were at
Fall of French Creek. Several contractors
have been over the line, and one of them
says the road will be built, and that the
grading will be completed by the end of
June.

It was learned in this city that the survey
is to be for a line about three miles
long, running from Kimberlin to French
Creek, where it connects with the Reading
railroad, forming a link of the long con-
templated Lancaster & Delaware River
railroad.
