

THE WILL SUSTAINED.

MEMBERS OF MARTIN H. FRY AGREE TO SETTLE THE CONTENT OVER IT.

The Plaintiff in a Suit to Recover For an Unsound Horse is Awarded \$103.51 by the Jury.

The jury in the suit of Solomon Mehrlach vs. Amos Shults, to recover for an unsound horse sold, rendered a verdict this morning in favor of plaintiff for \$103.51.

The suit of Jacob Wolf vs. O. G. Hull and F. W. Hull, doing business as Hull & Bro., was next attached for trial.

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The defense was that the cigars were sent by Mr. Wolf to Hull & Bro. to be sold on commission, and the amount of the promissory note was the net amount received for the cigars, and that was the best price obtainable for them.

On Monday afternoon the plaintiff examined A. F. Madlen, who was president of the board of trustees of the Seventh Day Baptist for a number of years, after which the charter and minutes of the society were read. These minutes run from 1814 to the present time, and their reading took all Tuesday afternoon and this morning's session of court.
