A FAEGLEYSVILLE HOW.

The Kirchoff family indulge in fights and law suits.

Amelia Kirchoff, a resident of Faegleysville, and her daughter Amelia Irvin, have been prosecuted before Alderman Deen for assault and battery.

The prosecutrix is Annie Kirchoff, who is married to Herman, a son of the oldest of the two assailants.

The old woman who does not like her daughter-in-law, wants to get her out of the house, as they have all been living together.

The old woman got drunk yesterday and endeavored to have her own way. She made an attack on Annie, and was assisted by her daughter, Herman, who was afraid of his mother and sister, refused to go to the assistance of his wife, but allowed her to be whipped while he remained upstairs.

A big racket was raised and word was sent to the station house.

Officers Crawford and Glass went to the scene of the racket to restore order. They took the two Kirchoff women into custody, but the old lady refused to walk, so she had to be hauled to the station house.

Both have since furnished bail for a hearing and peace again reigns.

THE COLORED VOTERS.

They Meet and Demand a Share of the Offices.

A meeting of the colored voters of this city was held at Fenton M. Harris' residence, No. 343 Middle street, on Tuesday evening. Several speeches were made and the Republican administration was censured for refusing to recognize the claims of colored men for office.

In this city the only recognition they ever had was the appointment of a market master. As they hold the balance of power in the city they claim that they are entitled to something more from every Republican administration.

At the conclusion of the speeches it was unanimously resolved that in the future the colored voter will decline to be used as a tool.

It was stated that the impression is general that the colored voter can be purchased on election day for \$2 a head, and it was decided to prove by their independence on election day that such will be the case no longer.

It was also decided not to take part in Saturday's primary. The merits of the Bull Ring and Hog Ring candidates were discussed and the conclusion reached was that neither of the factions cares for the colored man, after his vote is cast. There will be another meeting to-morrow night at the same place.

THE COLORED METHODISTS.

Arrangements Made to Buy a Building and Pay for It.

Arrangements have been made for a meeting at the court house on June 21, in the interest of the colored Methodist church. This congregation was organized in 1885 in the old bus engine house. The pastor of the church is Fenton M. Harris, by appointment of Bishop Stephen M. Merrill.

This congregation is small, but the members are earnest in their efforts to secure a permanent meeting place.

Subscription books have been in circulation for some time and these will be called in at the meeting on June 21.

Arrangements have been made to purchase the building in Faegleysville now used as a church, and it is expected that a sufficient sum will be subscribed by the time of the meeting to pay for the building, or at least a greater portion of it. The price agreed upon for the building is \$100.

Cherryman from Baltimore and Harrisburg will deliver addresses on that day.

The Tower Taken Down.

Yesterday workmen started to take down the large brick tower, which has stood since the building of Berger's large planing mill, on Beaver street, after the fire. This forenoon after a great quantity of bricks had been taken from the tower, it fell with a great crash. Most of the bricks fell into the cellar, but a portion fell on the frame houses of Mrs. Shenk on the northern side.

The kitchen of one was broken through, and both were very badly damaged. The houses had but recently been repaired and were about to be occupied.
