PALMER'S ADDRESS. began his address by referring to ster county as being the garden spot Ameaster county as being the garden spot of the world; said the large attendance of intelligent people who had left their farms, workshops and business places is an indication that the people of Lancaster county are active on the right side of the great question, and will give a good account of themselves on election day. He next discussed the liquor traffic and argued that it assites men to compile crime and that it es men to commit crime and that it lplies the burden of taxation. This 10,000 a year, and the annual cost of almal courts, the maintainence of one and poor houses, the direct result of the rum traffic is about \$116,000 per year. The liquor traffic is the enemy of home. position taken by some that the liquor men should be compensated for the loss sus-tained by them if prohibition is adopted. He said the question of license has been retionary with the granting power, om year to year, the past century. se men put their money into the liquor as they did so with their eyes open and if they lose the value of their property by a change of the law, it is nothing more than a business loss. No one believes that men should be compensated for business es and there is no reason why brewers and liquor men should be made an exception of. They have no claim for compen

He ridiculed the idea that business would suffer if prohibition was adopted in this state. There are annually spont in Pennsylvania for rum \$76,000,000. If the saloons are closed that money will find its way into the channels of trade and instead of one saloon keeper maintaining his family in comfort his fifty customers can give their families the comforts of life.

In conclusion he referred to the coming election on the proposed amendment, and predicted a glorious victory on the 18th of June, if its friends stood up manfully. He by virtue of his official position could give them the cheering assurance that the friends of the measure are active throughout the state and mean business. THE RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED.

Resolved, That we call upon the women of this county to labor in behalf of the adoption of this amendment, for it is they who suffer most from the curse of the liquor traffic.
