Some days ago the sporting men of the citywere given the tip on a cock fight which become quite popular of late among people who love this kind of sport. It was in the shape of a card which bore these words: Show, Thursday evening, May These tickets were sold, night between seventy - five and hundred people gathered at the s, the location of which was well known to all cook fighters. There was no regular main, but five fights

were arranged for \$10 a side. The men ted in the birds were all from Lancaster and for convenience we will call one party the Hill men and the other the West End. The former had several roosters from Marietta and a man from the long borough did the handling of their birds. The fighting egan at ten o'clock and lasted for several rs. The battles were of the sharpest kind, and a great deal of money changed unds. Although each side won two fights and one was a draw, the West End people are believed to have won more money than their opponents, as their birds took the first fights, on which there was much money.
