There seems to exist a good deal of small tato rivalry between the New Era and the York and the Harrisburg papers as to which section that each of these journals represents educates its pupils in the public schools at the lowest rates. The Harris-burg Telegraph seems ambitious to learn how it comes to pass that Lancaster can olucate at rates so much lower than those which prevail in the city blessed by all the enlightenment and trickery of a brilliant

Gentlemen, you had better select a more honorable and magnanimous subject for discussion than that of how to manage to pay teachers low salaries, so that pupils may be educated at the lowest rates per capita. It is no honor to any locality to icate its citizens at the expense of the teacher by paying salaries that are a fair It is possible for Harrisburg, or any other city, to compete with Lancaster in the low cost of educating pupils per capita, if the disposition exists to give teachers the very lowest remuneration That is the size of it, and the whole secret in the matter. Make the tax rate low, pay the teacher a correspondingly low salary and the problem of low priced edu cation is solved in a nut shell.

If any glory should be displayed in the matter of education it should be by the city that pays most for mental training rather than by the one that pays least. An insignificant pension clerk, who scarcely knows his multiplication table, receives a salary of which a teacher in Lancaster would feel proud. Were this same agent paid the salary that the majority of teachers get in this locality he would be laughed at by his fellows. Compared with the services of the teacher, who trains for citizenship, what is the labor of the agent referred to worth? Gentlemen, please take a subject more commensurate with your evident capacity of soul and intellect. Do not spend time in discussing the desirability of low priced education which can only be procured by paying teachers unbecoming Suit About a Bleycle.
